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50 Years of Sudduth Ownership

I have always loved camp. When I was young I would count the school days until I could head to Northern Wisconsin and paddle a canoe. At the end of my two weeks I would call home to see if I could stay for another session. My passion for the camp experience grew. During my last two years of college at the University of Wisconsin I worked at Wyonegonic and pursued a major in education so my summers could be free for camp. Those formative years have now

Those formative years have now turned into 60 summers at Wyonegonic.

After teaching for a year, I boarded a ship with 5 college friends to explore Europe. I met George who had just graduated from Williams College on that ride across the Atlantic. He was also taking a summer off as a camp counselor to visit his brother John who was stationed in Germany. George had accepted a teaching job so summers would be free to return to his beloved Camp Dudley. We became briefly acquainted, then went our separate ways after disembarking the ship.

After 2 months of traveling in Europe, we accidentally spotted each other in Paris when President Charles De Gaulle appeared on the steps of Notre Dame Cathedral to speak to the throngs of people lining the street. My friends said, "Oh my gosh, there are the rover boys from the ship." We tracked them down and after getting reacquainted, a few of us decided to explore Paris and then head for England before out flights back to the states.

Throughout our travels, we shared camp stories along the way. I remember the exact moment when George said to the group, "My dream is to go on a camping trip for my honeymoon." That grabbed my attention. In early September, George and I flew to our respective teaching jobs: George to St Louis Country Day; me to Madison Wisconsin. We continued finding ways to see each other and married two years later. George got his wish and we camped on our honeymoon visiting National Parks in the West. I had followed Jean McMullan 's advice, who was an assistant director to the Cobbs. She had told me to marry a school teacher so I could continue my passion for camping and put into action my leadership skills in the camping profession.

George was recruited by the Navy months after our wedding and while he was flying airplanes over the South China Sea, I returned to Wyonegonic with toddler Steve. Upon George's discharge in 1965, we were hired as assistant directors at Wyonegonic. George adjusted to 300 women in Denmark Maine after living on an air craft carrier with 3000 men. I assisted the Cobbs by hiring staff during the winter months while raising our two boys. George taught school and coached at Derby Academy in Hingham MA. In 1969, we had the opportunity to purchase

Wyonegonic from the Cobb family. We were young but eager. Call it luck, call it good timing, call it two parties who wanted it to resolve in our favor . . . a financial agreement was made in October 1969 to purchase the camp over a twenty-year period. Our first summer as owners was 1970 - 50 years ago.

As teachers we felt we had purchased the best classroom in the world. We were eager to share our love for the outdoors with children. We loved Wyonegonic so much George left his teaching job after two years so he could focus on Wyonegonic year-round. We added training clinics, Family Camp to the end of the camp season and ran three ski camps during winter vacation time. George died unexpectantly 21 years later while out for his daily jog on August 1st, 1991. With the support of the camp community and a capable leadership team, I was able to finish the summer in a meaningful way, but it was difficult without George who did so much and was a great friend to so many.

George and I had encouraged our children to make use of their college degrees in the workplace to receive formal business training before they came back to Wyonegonic. They took that message to heart. Steve came back from Colorado in 1993 to help direct Wyonegonic. He worked in the ski business for eight years. Susie followed after her graduation from Cornell, working for Camp Counselors USA in San Francisco; David joined Wyonegonic full time after 25 years working for Vail Resorts. Each of them brought valuable work experience to Wyonegonic and by 2016 I was able to turn

the operation over to my children. It has been a marvelous experience for me to be a part of the transition as the second generation of Sudduths manage Wyonegonic. Their skills complement each other, and I feel like a lucky Mom to be working with my three adult children.

Over the course of 117 years, Wyonegonic, the longest running girls camp in the US, has been guided by two generations of Cobbs and two generations of Sudduths. This is our

50th summer enjoying the hard work and benefits of working with children and staff, watching them gain self-confidence, loving the outdoors, and maturing into well-educated productive adults. We love following their journeys into the work place. Many of you have returned as parents and grandparents with such vivid memories and understanding of the values of the *Wyonegonic Experience*.

Much has remained the same over the decades but, as is natural, there have been some changes. We now have one dining hall, not two. Junior and Intermediate campers choose their weekly program and receive a computerized schedule each week. They are in activities together, but they live in their respective units. Campers can choose a 3 ½ week session or 7 weeks. The previous Junior Wiggie collapsed in heavy snows, but the outcome was a new handcrafted Junior Wiggie and an outside deck built around the old fireplace. Uniforms have gone from bloomers to running shorts with logical style changes in between.

A few of the traditions have disappeared (e.g. green ties) but most have remained – the Pine Grove, Banquet, Candlenight, EPs, Evening Circle and Campfires at T-P Point. Activities have been added - a high ropes challenge course, a climbing wall, waterskiing, windsurfing, kayaking and longer canoe trips and higher mountains. But despite these changes, alums are pleased to see that Wyonegonic looks and feels the same when they visit. Campers still gain from the experience, they grow, they love making new friends, they are introduced to other cultures through international campers, and they love the pace of camp and the chance to live a summer close to nature away from their electronics.

The Sudduths feel fortunate to continue to carry out CE Cobb's vision. In honor of the Cobbs vision and our family's service to Wyonegonic, we are asking you to give \$50 for 50 years to the Wyonegonic Scholarship Fund. If our alums contribute \$50, countless campers would be afforded the gift of camp. I hope my story has inspired you to join your fellow campers in supporting the scholarship fund.

Growing up, summer was synonymous with Moose Pond. From age eleven to twentytwo, I spent summers head to toe in forest green (with an occasional splash of white or khaki). My camper years were formative, of course, but my time as a camp counselor was arguably even more valuable.

After graduating from college, I returned to Wyonegonic one last time. I knew the end of the summer would be the beginning of searching for a full-time job so began to think seriously about what I wanted to do with my life. My liberal arts degree had supposedly left endless career options, but all I really wanted to be was a year-round camp counselor. What career could possibly be as rewarding? Wyo had set the bar high.



As a counselor, you get to take part in molding young minds in such a profound way. You're trained to create an environment of support and love and inclusion for every camper. You need to be creative, motivating and empathetic. You need to love Aunt and Uncle Teeth as if they actually were your aunt and uncle. You get to be surrounded by women (and a handful of "uncles") who are intent on changing the world. I knew I wouldn't be singing Build Me Up Buttercup or making wet day fires in my future 9-to-5, but I was determined to find a place where I could feel as good as I did on the shores of Moose Pond.

Teaching was the obvious answer. I'd led a cabin, I was definitely well-suited to lead a classroom. And the fact that I would have had summers free to return to Maine was too appealing to pass up. So, I gave myself a 6-month trial teaching English abroad.

It took me far less than 6 months to realize that teaching was not for me. I lack the patience so many of my teacher friends have. (You are all amazing, I don't know how you do it!)

I crossed teaching off the list and tried to think more broadly. What was I really looking for? I wanted a place that promotes a sense of community, one that values the support and inclusion I knew all too well from summer camp. I looked for opportunities to utilize a camp counselor's communication and problem-solving skills. But most importantly, I knew I needed to be in a workplace that had that greater-than-us mentality that is instilled in Wyo women.

So, I floated around trying out roles in industries like PR, higher ed and non-profits. And eventually, through much trial and error, I found my way. I work for a program at Dana-Farber/Harvard

Cancer Center, with the mission of reducing the burden of cancer in underserved populations. I don't get to write banquet songs or short sheet campers' beds, but I am in the beginning stages of a rewarding career working with individuals who share a commitment to an important cause. I am on a team where my camp counselor skill set is both valued and needed.

Throughout this career soul-searching, there were moments I doubted I could be as fulfilled in an office as I was in a cabin. I've learned that there are work communities out there that foster that same support and inclusion that we get every year on the shores. There are also companies that need our help. They need the bigpicture thinking of someone who can choose a theme for Grove, the problem-solving skills of navigating camper drama, and the adaptability of leading Gold Rush when a thunderstorm rolls in. They need a summer camp counselor.

My counselor was at the door to greet her 5 arriving campers. With dimples in her cheeks and a wonderful smile, Annie Barto (Annie Williamson after her marriage to Winona counselor Bob Williamson) welcomed us to a summer on Moose Pond. I knew immediately that I could always count on her for support, guidance, and affection. She became a part of my life,

not only for the rest of my time at Wyonegonic but for decades beyond that. As the riding counselor she guided me through "walk, trot, and canter," erasing my anxieties and assuring me that I wouldn't fall off the horse. When she was head of camp craft, overnight canoe trips became an important part of my camp life. She knew the flora and fauna of the Maine woods and Pleasant Mountain and shared her knowledge with campers. She loved everything about camp and camping, and it showed.

Wanting to be just like Annie, I decided that I would go to her alma mater, Wellesley. After college she went to graduate school at the University of Michigan, which was about two hours from where my younger sister Louise (also Wyonegonic) and I lived. My father and my mother, Barbara Payson Bowen, (a close friend of Helen Cobb and a Wyonegonic counselor) welcomed visits from Annie during her time in Ann Arbor. She brought affection and a good sense of humor into the house.

Annie never ceased to be part of my life. She and Bob welcomed my husband Perry and me whenever we were in Maine, at Cape Elizabeth or on Damariscotta Lake. They came to my daughter Payson's wedding in Portland. When Bob died I saw a brave Annie and their beloved dog at his funeral. Perry and I last visited Annie in Yarmouth, about two years ago. Yes, she was getting older and showing it some. But she remained upbeat and had not lost her sense of humor. She was still Annie, my Wyonegonic Annie."

Mary Graves Vonnegut Wyonegonic 1970-1975; 1977 & 1980

It has been 50 years since I packed my first trunk with a very specific array of new things: high-waisted green Bermuda shorts, pressed white blouses, a wonderful new green wool jacket with a W on the pocket. Disappointing that the list didn't include the knotted tie earlier campers wore. In June 1969 I

was eleven years old and on my way to Camp Wyonegonic. I didn't know anyone at camp, but I felt like I was going home.

My first memories of Wyo belonged to my mother, Anne Williams. You can find her name on a few of those old leader skins. She was a Stormcloud (as was I, of course). She went to Wyonegonic in the late 1930s because my grandmother's cousin somebody-or-other had gone in the early nineteen-teens and had loved it. Mom travelled to camp on the mail boat from Denmark. I wish I had a picture. She prepared me for Wyo with camp songs and funny stories - the silly great things between girls that camp is made of. Mom never taught me to play jacks, but she made sure I had a new bag in my 1969 trunk. I still love jacks. Flashlights, too.



Coco & Mary

Inty Cabin 6, Senior Cabin 12, Senior Cabin 4, Senior Cabin 1, CIT... those were my addresses. I'm pretty certain my Inty Cabin 6 counselor grew up in South County, Rhode Island, where I live now. Evidence that camp circles around you, gets into the fabric of your life, pulls you close. I was at a dinner in Newport, Rhode Island a couple of summers ago with my husband, son, a college friend and his wife. The wife, of course, went to Wyo. I knew her sister and her brother at Winona. As we launched into easy remembrances I could hear my husband exhaling his "Wyo Mafia" sigh. He does that a lot.

1969 was eight weeks of self-discovery. Life was blissfully unencumbered. My new friends and I laughed and played and tried new things with encouragement from our counselors and each other. Sure, there was plenty of petty girl conflict, but it played out with little drama, because our community was committed to being a healthy whole. Camp did conflict well at all ages. It definitely prepared me for big league predominantly male environments, like 1970s Exeter, 1980s Harvard Business School, and work.

Summer after summer, Wyo was a healthy reset. Healthy eating (I tried "no thank you" servings with my kids, but, sadly, it didn't work). Lots of healthy exercise and physical self-confidence. Healthy socialization. When I run strategy workshops for clients I mix up the seating and carefully designate power seats like the head and foot of camp dining tables. I hated rest hour, but it was healthy, too. When I visited my camp friend in Buffalo, NY during the winter, her mother insisted we separate for a period

of rest each day. She knew we would have spun ourselves into exhaustion without quiet time. My friend's mother was a Wyo girl, too. Sunday Grove gave rhythm to summer weeks. Healthy souls. Healthy routines are my friends for life: make the bed, three meals, no snacks, daily exercise. Thanks, Wyo.

What's more healthy than can-do and self-confidence? I grew a lot of both at camp. Daily swims in Moose Pond no matter the weather. The swim test and the tippy test. After my first summer I don't remember thinking about failing at anything. Where else in life does that happen?

Do you carry around mental vignettes that are as sharp as things that happened yesterday? I do, and I have a whole bunch from Wyo. Climbing on Inty cabin 5/6 rafters after taps, kicking my legs while my friends and I whispered and giggled. Full disclosure? You might still be able to find my name carved on a few of those rafters. Endless fanny bumps in Moose Pond. Eating too many blueberries high up in the Grove near the treehouse. Eating too many other things. "Kiyi, Kiyi, please pass extra dessert to the CIT table." Riding for hours in the trip truck

(what was it called?). Bouncing and complaining, full of happy expectations about the adventure ahead or the imminent comfort of the fire-warmed Wiggy. Taking a soapy. They were the best, but I'm very grateful to George and Carol for paying attention to the environment, and I hope they seeded the world with environmentally conscious women. Canoe trips where we didn't see anyone for days. Regatta races, my friend and I a perfect team. Hanging out in the Wiggy. My daughter (a Wyo girl) and I agree that we are as good as it gets at passing time. It's an important talent in this purposeful world.

I've done my own Wyo web spinning. When my kids were at camp we stayed for family camp with very dear non-camp friends. Their daughters and my kids were pseudo siblings. The two younger girls begged to go to Wyo, which we all agreed was inevitable. They loved much of what I loved about Wyonegonic. No intrusion from the outside world. Just people. People who came back year after year. Girls following mothers. Sisters following sisters and cousins (and brothers). Generations walking through life together.

I'm getting ready for my daughter's November wedding. My husband wants to sing to our future son-in-law, whom we call Sue. It's not hard to guess the tune - Johnny Cash's "A Boy Named Sue." The words are completely inappropriate for a wedding. But no worries, I told my husband, I wrote countless Wyo trip songs and banquet songs. Want to hear me sing "Oh my gawd The Umbagog"?
