Dear Wyonegonic Families,

Last August the Boston Globe printed an article written by Michael Thompson, author of two well known books on youth development

Raising Cain: Protecting the Emotional Life of Boys
The Pressured Child: Helping Your Child to Achieve Success in School and in Life

A few of our Key Staff heard Michael Thompson speak at a conference last October and we raved about his wisdom. I wish to share the article with you. If you were able to read this article last summer, it is worth reading again; if you did not, here is your chance...

I went to Vermont for a week this summer and rediscovered a fantastic lost world of family traditions. A world where people sit down and eat three meals together every day, serving their food from platters and talking with one another throughout the meal. A world where 10 year olds set the table for dinner and clear it, without complaint. A world where 13-year old boys don't play video games every night or watch TV or sit in front of computers.

Instead they lie in bed and read - comic books, novels, sometimes even grown up novels. In this world 11-year-old girls walk together holding hands as easily as they laugh and talk. No frenzied instant messaging here. Instead they sing. Every morning as they make their beds and sweep out their rooms, they sing together. One girl starts a song, and others join in spontaneously.

Of course this fantasy world is not a lost one. It is summer camp.

When I visited a camp for a week last month, some 40 years since I last attended one, I was struck hard by how rarely children engage in these activities anywhere else: not in schools, not in neighborhoods, not in families. Summer camps are one of the last places that kids can learn the so-called "family values" that hard pressed families no longer have time to teach.

Doubtless, fun and friends are an important part of the camp experience, and the children I saw were having fun. But fun was not at the core of the camper's psychological experience.

From my viewpoint, three valuable elements dominated the campers' days. They were living in a multigenerational community, they were following hallowed rituals that were universally respected, and they had a lot of downtime. Ritual surrounded every aspect of the day, from wake-up reveille and tent inspection to the day's end with taps and a lullaby.

Yes, lullaby. At 9:30 p.m. we senior staff members stood together singing a version of the Brahms lullaby with camp lyrics to a circle of tents in the woods. The children were asleep by 9:45 p.m., and they slept solidly until 7:30 when the ritual changing of the bell woke them again.

Is there anywhere else in the United States where children, ages 8-15, hear a lullaby every night? Is there anywhere where 14-year olds reliably get 10 hours of sleep at night?

Whatever else our children find at camp, the painful truth is that we often send them away to experience aspects of family life they can't find at home anymore.

After all, there can't be too many family dinners when you're driving your children to the 90-game ice hockey schedule required of 13-year olds on the select ice hockey teams of North Andover.

You can't have much of an evening ritual when children watch TV or play computer games right up until bedtime. And there isn't much down-time in a family where the children are immersed in music lessons, tutoring, martial arts, town sports, SAT prep courses and more.

The only place a child from a high pressured family can enjoy some peace and quiet and perhaps a good night's sleep (with a lullaby) is away from home.

Why does it matter? Because children need it. Children don't develop because they are pushed, prodded and pressured to develop for sports teams or "good" colleges. Development is their biological

and psychological imperative. It is the job of adults to create environments where children have the time, freedom, and safety to grow up at their own pace.

In Vermont I was struck by the fact that summer camp provides something that is in short supply in our fast-paced worlds: respected ritual, time for the generations to get to know one another, and the opportunity to take a nap or read a book after lunch each day. I hope camps like these can maintain their traditions in the face of the frantic, competitive zeitgeist of Modern America.

I'm worried they will all become specialized (and driven) learning camps, teaching Division 1 sports skills or computer skills. I hope not. I plan to go back next summer and do some singing. I don't seem to have time for it around my house." Michael Thompson

We would like to assure Mr. Thompson and anyone reading this article that Wyonegonic will remain a traditional resident camp allowing campers to choose activities; provide a focus on waterfront activities, canoe and hiking trips and a property maintained to keep the fundamentals of simple living a part of the camp experience. Girls will walk hand in hand down the cabin line. Campers will read, write letters and sing. Traditions enjoyed by thousands for over a century will be woven in to the daily lives of the 250 campers that visit the shores of Moose Pond each summer.

Candlenight anyone? Come join us August 15th and sing with the staff after the ceremony as we visit each cabin with our lit candles and close harmony bidding the campers a sound sleep, farewell and a productive school year.

### CAMP DIRECTOR'S DREAM



We are proud to tell you about two special people on the Wyonegonic staff - both RNs who have been with Wyonegonic ten consecutive summers. Although this summer they earn their Wiggie Chairs for 10 years of service, our gratitude reaches far deeper as directors, staff and camper community... Donna and Jill have helped us all enjoy healthy and safe summers at Wyonegonic.



JILL GASPERINI arrived at Wyonegonic in 1996 with her two children, Taya and Paul. Jill learned about our need for a nurse through her sister-in-law Kathy, who had spent summers as a nurse at Winona. Jill was captured by the opportunity for her children and loved the out-of-doors and a chance to use her nursing skills in the camp environment. Jill says, "I wish camp was all year round." For a few summers Jill maintained her supervisory position at a Boston hospital and arranged her time so she could be a camp nurse for half a summer. The last five years she has been with us for the entire summer and broadened her role as a key staff member. Jill directed Junior Camp for two summers and currently is on our key staff team and supports Unit Directors, camp administration and supervises the Wyonegonic Health Center, offering relief on days off and time off. Jill received her B.S.N. from the University of Maryland and a Master's Degree in Nursing Administration at the University of Washington in Seattle. She has held various jobs in clinical nursing, as well as recruitment, supervision, school nursing and currently is an adjunct professor supervising nursing students at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Jill loves to hike and last August she prepared for a climb up 14,000 Mt Rainier. She was turned around with howling 40 m/p/h winds, sleet, rain and no visibility. That experience has spurred her on to want to hike more and she has her eye on the 4,000 footers in the White Mountains of NH. If all goes well, she will be half way through the 48 peaks by the end of Fall. Jill also enjoys wind surfing, biking, skiing and traveling with her family. Jill and her husband Gerard live in Lexington MA.

DONNA PATTERSON arrived in 1996 as Junior Unit Director. She had leadership experience in the Girl Scouts and also loved the out of doors. Donna lives in Lansdale PA with her husband Joe and four children, Carlyn, Sara, Katie and Joey. Donna's children range in age from 21 to 13 and they have all been involved at camp over her years of service. She has worked in the Wyonegonic Health Center full time since 1997 until last summer when her work schedule changed. She began commuting from Pennsylvania to work a four day a week camp nurse job at Wyonegonic. She combined this with her clinical work, three days a week, as a pediatric nurse practitioner, in the area of her home in Willow Grove, PA. "I just can't imagine a summer without Moose Pond swims," said Donna. So, every Wednesday night she flew to Maine to work 4 days before stepping on a plane to return to her pediatric nurse practitioner responsibilities in PA Monday afternoon. Donna received a B.S.N. from Thomas Jefferson University, an M.S.N. in Maternal Child Health at the University of Delaware, and a PHD and pediatric nurse practitioner certificate from the University of Pennsylvania. Although Donna's primary responsibility is as a nurse practitioner, she previously taught at Villanova and continues to teach undergraduate and graduate nursing students at U. of Penn and Gwynedd Mercy College. 



### Wyonegonic Family Camp Questions & Answers

#### Who comes?

"Family" in family camp is broadly interpreted. Singles are welcome, family groups, reunion groups, significant others, single parents . . . We have between 100-125 folks at one time.

### Why do alumnae come?

It is a great family time with plenty of activities happening all day or no activity, if you choose. Life is simple, the change of pace a welcome for most. Meals are prepared, phones don't ring, carpools are not necessary . . . Pleasant Mountain and Moose Pond are calling for all ages. Come share something you enjoyed as a child with your family.

### Do we have our own cabin?

We assign families to a cabin, yurt, or platform tent (if they request). If you wish to share a cabin with old camp friends or relatives, we will assign you to a duplex. Keep in mind our bathroom facilities and hot showers are centralized. We can accommodate a few families who have special needs.

### Will I know anybody?

If you bring somebody you will. Don't forget how easy it is to make friends at camp. About 50% of the families are alumnae; about 75% are returning families, who have been with us from 2 to 20 years. Some just can't stay away and rank it as a high priority every year for their family. We can provide you with contact information for past camp friends you would like to entice.

#### What do we do every day?

Your choice - you can try our ropes course 35 feet in the air or read the Sunday paper in a canoe as you float on Moose Pond; you can ride a horse through Wyo's trails or rest in a hammock; you can go shopping at LL Beans or bask in the sunshine on the dock.

### Can we stay for more than one session?

Of course - as long as we have cabin availability

### How is the food?
